



WHAT WE SPENT IN 2019/20

- The Parish Council is only allowed to spend money for specific reasons that are listed in law and these reasons are extremely limited (particularly when compared with the District and County Councils)
- Parish Councillors are not paid, give their time voluntarily and must abide by a local government code of conduct and declare their financial interests in the Parish
- The major running cost of the Council is the salary and expenses of the Parish Clerk - this is a crucial position and one that is mandated in law
- The budget for 2019/20 was decided upon based on a precept of £9,000 set in December 2018
- The Parish Council has the ability to support organisations that provide value and service to residents of the Parish through small discretionary grants (up to an amount set by law of £8.12 per elector in 2019/20)
- ◆ In 2019 / 20 the Council made a significant one-off capital contribution of £35,000 from its 'depot fund' reserve towards the replacement of the village hall. The 'depot fund' is money received by NLPC when the excouncil depot, which was developed into Hawkes Hill Close, was sold. This money can only be spent on certain projects within the Parish with the joint agreement of Warwickshire County Council
- NLPC received an amount of £817.60 towards the cost of the replacement Millennium Green bench from its insurers (the bench was damaged beyond repair by a delivery driver who was found to not be covered by appropriate insurance— unfortunately necessitating an insurance claim by the Council on its own policy)

- NLPC voted to increase the precept to £10,000 in the financial year 2020/21. This represents an increase of £1,000 from the preceding year and this increase will help cover the increased costs facing the Council
- Unlike many other Parish Councils, NLPC does not have a village hall, other buildings or land from which it can receive an income
- NLPC only receives precept funding from those parts of the 'village' in Warwick District Council's area—areas of the 'village' in Wolverton and Claverdon pay their precept to their respective Parish Councils

🏦 PLANNING

PLANNING

- Planning is an area that takes up a lot of the Parish Council's consideration and time and it is certainly the area of responsibility that normally generates most interest/comment from members of the Public! This has particularly been the case since the last Parish Assembly with two major planning applications affecting the Parish under consideration
- NLPC does not have the power to decide any planning application within the Parish—that responsibility lies with Warwick District Council (WDC). WDC do however formally consult with NLPC on all planning applications within the Parish, to ensure that the views of the local community are taken into account (though NLPC always suggests that members of the public also comment directly to WDC on any application they are concerned about)
- All planning decisions are made within a complex legal framework—any comments or objections NLPC makes to WDC must have a sound basis in planning law. NLPC cannot simply object to something because they don't 'like it', rather it must ensure that the objection is based on a valid planning ground
- As the entire Parish is located in the Green Belt, all applications have to be scrutinised carefully to ensure there is no detrimental impact on the openness of the countryside and the rural nature of the area. Further material considerations for the Council include that the 'centre' of the Parish is a Conservation Area, there are a number of listed buildings throughout the Parish and the Parish has a strong and thriving agricultural sector. Each of these considerations brings with it a differing raft of policies and law
- Due to the unfortunate Parish Boundaries in the area of Red Horse Corner, planning applications that appear to be in the 'village' of Norton Lindsey, may actually lie outside of Norton Lindsey Parish. This is particularly the case with developments in Morgan Close, Brick Kiln Close and along Wolverton Road (including Norton Lea) – all of which are outside of the Parish and lie in Stratford-Upon-Avon District. NLPC regrettably has no formal role in the decision making process of any planning applications in these areas, but it does try and ensure that its voice is heard by the other Parish/District Councils
- Since the last Parish Meeting the Council has considered sixteen planning applications and has objected to four of these on planning grounds. It has also been neutral to or supported a further twelve applications
- The Council tries to object to applications very rarely and much prefers working with applicants/planning teams to try and reach agreement between all parties

BRICK-KILN CLOSE

Although this site lies just outside of the Parish boundary (residing by just a few metres in Claverdon Parish), NLPC has taken a lead role in representing the views of all parts of the 'village' of Norton Lindsey in regards to the application to build around twelve residential properties on land behind Brick Kiln Close.

It is however regrettable that NLPC has no formal involvement in the process of this application, even though it will affect the Parish greatly, simply because the adjoining Parish is in Stratford-Upon-Avon rather than Warwick District.

NLPC carried out an in-depth survey to ascertain the views of the public (available on the NLPC website) and has represented these views to Stratford-upon-Avon District Council, who ultimately will decide on this application.

NLPC has objected to the proposal on a number of grounds, not least of which is that the application is concerned solely with the housing needs of Claverdon, a community some miles from the site, with no public transport links available.

At the time of writing, this application is currently still under consideration by the Stratford-Upon-Avon District Council Planning Team —when the application comes up for decision by the planning committee, NLPC will request to appear before the committee to present our views.

THE CHICKEN SHEDS

Over the last eighteen months NLPC has been consulted on several different applications concerning development at the site of the Chicken Sheds in Littleworth, just on the edge of the 'village'.

The site has a long and very involved planning history and applications have been received since the last Parish Assembly not only for residential housing on the site (which was rejected by both Warwick District Council and on appeal by the Planning Inspectorate), but more recently for the restarting of commercial chicken breeding operations (including residential housing for a site manager).

NLPC has helped the local community represent their views (via a series of public meetings) to Warwick District Council and has itself objected strongly to these recent commercial proposals - due to the impact on the quality of life of nearby residents, pollution, traffic and concern for the green-belt.

| HIGHWAYS & FLOODING | SPEEDING |

| Since the last Parish Assembly NLPC has reported numerous highway issues including pot-holes, crumbling road-edges, stolen signs, overhanging hedges and missing road markings to Warwickshire County Council (who have responsibility for all highway matters) – but by far the most significant ongoing issue is blocked/overflowing gullies and subsequent highway flooding. NLPC are pushing the County Council to renew and refurbish these drains wherever possible – but budgets mean that this problem is likely to be ongoing for sometime – so please report any issues you see, as soon as you see them! You can report highway issues either via the Clerk of NLPC or to WCC directly at <u>warwickshire.fixmystreet.com</u> . | One of the regular concerns raised by members of the public is speeding within the Parish – particularly when an accident on the A46 or M40 causes commuter traffic to use the village as a 'rat-run' to/from the Snitterfield area. Unfortunately the Parish Speedwatch volunteers were not able to start monitoring traffic speeds as no volunteer could be found to co-ordinate the group and manage the administration of the scheme. Anyone interested in reestablishing the group should contact the Parish Clerk who can supply you with the right contacts! Remember that a 30MPH sign marks the beginning of a speed restriction and all drivers should be at this speed (or below!) at the sign, not a hundred metres after it! |
| REWILDING | GRIT-BINS |
| Rewilding is the large scale restoration of ecosystems and nature habitats in order to revive lost indigenous species. Pollinator populations are currently declining and the loss of flower-rich habitats, which would usually act as sources of food, shelter, and nesting sites, is the primary cause. Tightly mown verges are monocultures, deserts of nature, but through sowing wildflowers we can help reintroduce biodiversity not only in plants but also in animals and insects. Throughout the year – including winter – these wildflower verges provide food and cover for pollinators, birds, and small animals. Rewilded verges require much less maintenance, as they do not need to be mown or cut and naturally reoccur, and they would be much more attractive, as many wildflowers bloom from early spring to winter. The Parish Council have resolved to investigate over the coming months, the feasibility of rewilding sections of the Parish highways and green spaces to aid bio-diversity. | Winter is fast approaching and NLPC would like to remind residents that there are a number of yellow grit-bins located throughout the Parish at highway 'trouble-spots'. NLPC has recently paid for the replacement of a number of these bins that had been damaged in previous years. These bins are intended for the public to use to supplement the regular gritting activities of the County Council. It is always appreciated when residents clear areas of snow/ice and then use the grit to prevent ice reforming, but do take care when you do so! Please note that the provided grit can ONLY be used on a public highway or pavement—it is not permitted to use this grit to clear private paths and/or drives. Bins which are close to being empty should be reported to either the County Council via their website or you can also contact NLPC. Gritting routes in Warwickshire can be found at www.warwickshire.gov.uk/gritting. |
| BLACON TRACK CIRCUIT | DOG WASTE |
| NLPC has continued to explore possibilities around completing the missing 'gap' in the footpath between the Blacon Farm Track and Arles Cottage on the 60mph stretch of Snitterfield Lane. Unfortunately the likely cost involved in providing a formal footpath is prohibitive unless external funding can be found (and even finding funding to determine the eventual cost is proving difficult!). NLPC are pleased to report however, that as suggested at the last Parish Assembly, Warwickshire County Council (via our local Councillor Les Caborn), is intending to provide funding to place a set of 'pedestrians in the roadway' signs along the stretch of road on the approach to the Blacon Farm Track, in order to encourage traffic to slow down and take more care. As all councillors recognise the central part this walking circuit plays in the health and fitness activities of the Parish, we shall continue to seek out funding opportunities. | Discussions are ongoing with Warwick District Council concerning the emptying of the two 'closed' dog waste bins – one in Canada Lane and the other at the pedestrian entrance to the Playing Fields. Although the bins have been clearly marked as being closed, some members of the public are still leaving dogwaste bags on or around the bins – including 'hanging' them from nearby gates and hedges. This is illegal, antisocial and a major health hazard. Local land-owners are also considering closing 'permitted' footpaths if the situation continues. Members of the public are reminded that as well as the unsealed dog-waste bins, dog-waste can be disposed of in in the ordinary litter bins at the Bus Stop and by the Village Hall carpark entrance, and in householders standard grey bin refuse collection. Bag it, and bin it in a bin! Don't leave it for other people to deal with |

VILLAGE HALL & PLAYING FIELDS

It is a year since the Hall reopened. The ribbon was cut by one of the village's longest residing residents, Ken Chapman, now sadly deceased and its most junior, Felicity Davies.

In December, a few Trustees resigned and Anna Mace-Leska was appointed Chair, she is also the Parish Council representative. In March, Ashley Hollingshead was appointed Treasurer.

From the time of reopening in October 2019, the Hall steadily became booked with classes and most weekends there was at least one children's party. The Sniffer's had several events and the Concert performed by Tarantara was sold out and we managed to hold a few cinema sessions.

Then came lockdown and we had to close, reopening in September in a limited capacity for low risk activities and within GOV.UK guidelines. We gratefully received a £10,000 grant from WDC designed to keep rural Village Halls open.

No indoor social events could be held but we held a successful Picnic in the Park and a Scarecrow competition. Further outdoor community focused events will be planned.

As Trustees, we meet on Zoom. We have regular updates on the Covid-19 regulations and what we are able to do to keep all users safe. The AGM has been deferred until Spring 2021, accounts available on website.

We would very much like to invite any Villager to join us in helping to run the Village Hall (you don't have to become a Trustee to volunteer). It is your Village Hall and any extra input would be very welcome, particularly if you have secretarial skills or are interested in helping with events, when life returns to normal.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR UPDATE

It is a bit late for my usual annual report but we approved a budget in February based on sound economic growth with investment in services and capital projects. One of these is Stanks Island—now very close to completion. Also our new fleet of gritters has arrived for winter, new to us but used ones as more cost efficient.

Then Covid arrived which as cabinet member for Health and Adult Social Care has taken over my time. We are working on the resurgence and have established Infection Management Teams for North, South and Rugby working with the district councils and additional staff. We are a national Beacon Council for covid jointly with Rugby and Solihull and we are a national exemplar of good practice. These IMT are funded for 18 months. We have been commended by the Care Quality Commission for our support of all care homes across the county and domiciliary care. We have been a national study for working with SWFT to get people out of hospital and into care settings , including back home within hours rather than days. Our PPE warehouse is stocked with the right PPE to last until March and more stock arriving to support our care sector. I meet regularly with our Director of Public Health to discuss outbreaks and our TIER rating and issues such as lockdown.

WCC and Cabinet have agreed to approach the Government on becoming a Unitary Authority, as we would form a more efficient council and save millions in operating costs—discussions are ongoing.

Councillors and all our staff are working from home, delivering our services as seamless as possible as the day job continues despite the Covid; as do Council meetings all of which are broadcast to the public. We have recruited through this period over 200 additional care workers for our care sector and over 20 new foster carers have come forward and taken placements. A great tribute to our residents.

Finally in case we do not meet publicly, it is time to say good bye as I will be retiring at the May elections after 16 years as your councillor and 40 years in the role. Thanks for all your help and support, we have made a difference working together.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT RE-ORGANISATION

The County of Warwickshire currently operates a three-tier system of local government.

The first tier consists of a single council which operates county wide -Warwickshire County Council. The County Council is responsible for the provision of major public services such as roads, those educational services still in local government control, social care and libraries.


The second tier consists of five 'district' or 'borough' councils. These councils are each responsible for local services in their 'part' of Warwickshire- including planning, recycling, refuse collection and leisure.

Norton Lindsey Parish lies within Warwick District Council's area and along with twenty-four other Parish councils makes up the third-tier of Local Government. NLPC's major role is to represent the views of the local community to the other councils (particularly in planning matters) and provide targeted local activities and focused financial funding.

Successive governments have made moves towards combining county and district councils into single 'unitary' councils - which have responsibility for the provision of <u>all</u> services. The argument in favour of unitary authorities is that they can provide a more cost effective and streamlined operation and reduce confusion over which council provides which service.

In the past few months the County Council has suggested to the Government that a single Warwickshire wide unitary authority should be established, whilst the five district Councils have proposed two unitary authorities with one for the North and one for the South (combining Warwick and Stratford).

Both of these plans foresee an enhanced role for Parish Councils in one form or another, but what role is currently unclear. Two major consultations are likely to take place in the next six months and NLPC will almost certainly be seeking the views of residents - watch this space!



USEFUL CONTACTS

GRANTS

Norton Lindsey Parish Council has the power to award grants to local clubs, groups and organisations which, in its opinion, directly benefit the Parish or residents of the Parish.

If you run such an organisation, then we'd be delighted to hear from you if you would like to request funding.

All applications for grants must be made after fully reading NLPC's grants policy and then completing a grant application form and returning it by email to the NLPC Clerk. Both the policy and application form can be found on the nortonlindseypc.org website.

Grant applications must be received by 31 January and will be considered at the February ordinary meeting.

The Clerk will be happy to offer informal advice on an application, without commitment, at any time.

Please note that as a Parish Council, there are restrictions on both the amounts and organisations that we are able to support.

DEFIBRILLATOR

As you are probably aware we have a defibrillator in the village. It is located on the side of the electricity cabinet to the left of the Village Hall front door.

In the event of a sudden cardiac arrest the use of a defibrillator can increase the chances of survival if used along with immediate CPR before the paramedics arrive. Our machine has never been used but many public access defibrillators have been used successfully and after the person has received prompt medical treatment has recovered.

The defibrillator can be accessed by using a code, that you will be given when calling 999, to open the door.

The machine is registered with West Midlands Ambulance Service and Anne Cooke checks it regularly so that it is always ready for use.

The cabinet is illuminated at night and is available for use by anyone 24 hours a day. The defibrillator is very easy to use and it gives verbal instructions to the user.

Anne Cooke normally holds a free CPR and defibrillator training session at the Village Hall annually, but obviously that has been difficult this year. Hopefully she will be able to arrange a free training session next year.

COVID-19 HOTLINE

They can provide direct support for a number of issues and help tap into the additional support being provided by community and voluntary groups.
