MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

It is wonderful to be able to communicate with you all again, after a trying couple of years. I know that this time has not been easy for any of us, and that my absence, combined with Covid-19, has caused difficulties for the spiritual life of the Arden Valley. I would like to thank all of those who have done so much to 'keep the show on the road' - especially the churchwardens, Joan, Richard, Lizzie, and Stig. We have been truly blessed in having such wonderful people across the benefice who have stepped up to the plate and done so much to keep our churches going throughout all the trials and tribulations of the recent past. I know also that there have been a lot of questions about what will be happening in the future, and I hope that I will be able to address some of these questions now.

You will know from Archdeacon Sue's last communication that I have received a rebuke and an injunction from Bishop Christopher in regard to specific matters within the Clergy Discipline Measure complaint made against me. When I last met with Bishop Christopher in early June, he explained that a rebuke does not mean the end of ministry, and that the injunctions which have been put on my ministry will not prevent my return to ministry. It was the Bishop's wish, that given the 'long and arduous' nature of what we have all been through that I should return to ministry 'as soon as practicably possible'.

I can therefore announce that I will be returning to ministry in the Arden Valley. I do not yet know exactly when that will happen, as it is dependent on a DBS check, but I am in contact with the Churchwardens, the Safeguarding Team, and Archdeacon Sue with regards to this, and you will be told dates just as soon as we know them. I'm afraid that there's really very little we can do to speed this process up, so we must just continue to practice our patience!

Although I am very much looking forward to returning to ministry, I have had to make some difficult decisions regarding my future with you. After discussing the situation with both bishops, some fellow clergy, and a host of family and friends, I have decided that I will be leaving the Arden Valley, probably in the first few months of next year. This has not been an easy decision to make, but I feel that it is the least bad solution to a very difficult situation - it will give us all the opportunity of making a fresh start, whilst also providing for a proper finish to my ministry with you and allowing us time to properly prepare for what the future has in store for us. Bishop Christopher is entirely supportive of this plan, and it is his hope, I believe, that we use what time we have left together as constructively as possible, not least in beginning to address the questions around the future of the benefice more generally.

I know that for some this will be an unwelcome shock, and I apologise for the circumstances which have led us to this situation. I am greatly sorry for my actions, and for the consequences which have caused such hardship and uncertainty across the benefice. Please know that I have been holding all of you in my daily prayers throughout these past two years, and I will continue to do so in the future.

Maps have always been a pleasure for me, especially where possible routes can be explored, and journeys and walks, imaginary or real, can be planned. With the recent poor weather there seem to have been rather more walks in my head than on my feet, but surely that will change soon.

We are each at the centre of God's love, and we each have the opportunity to share and experience that, as we meet others on the Way.



HARVEST SUPPER



RECIPE – BANANA AND CHOCOLATE CUPCAKES

Ideal for children to make...with some adult supervision!

Ingredients

You will need 12 cupcake paper cases.

For the sponge

120g plain flour
140g caster sugar
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp cinnamon
1 tsp ground ginger
Pinch of salt
5 tbs unsalted butter
120 ml whole milk
2 eggs
1 banana mashed

For the Frosting

300g icing sugar 4½ tbs unsalted butter (softened) 40g unsweetened cocoa powder 2 tbs whole milk 1½ oz chocolate shavings

Method

- Heat oven to 170c (325F)
- Mix flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, ground ginger, salt and butter into a bowl and beat with an electric whisk.
- Slowly pour milk into mixture and mix well. Add eggs and beat well.
- Stir in mashed banana by hand. Spoon the mixture into cupcakes cases and bake in the oven for 20 minutes. Leave to cool.
- To make the frosting, heat icing sugar, butter and cocoa, slowly adding the milk continuously beating until the frosting is light and fluffy.
- Spoon onto the cakes and decorate with chocolate shavings.





BUS SERVICE IMPROVEMENT PLAN PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT SURVEY

NORTON LINDSEY CRICKET CLUB

2021 has not been the best season for cricket at Norton Lindsey. The league 1st XI has had a very poor season, with only one victory to their name and, to add salt to the wound, lost to the club at the bottom of the table in August. The result is that, unless a miracle occurs, the Club will be relegated from the Premier Division of the Cotswold Hills League.

On 29 July the Club hosted a match between representative teams from the Cotswold Hills League and the Warwickshire League. In excellent weather, the Cotswold team chased down a total of over 300 in 40 overs - a real exhibition of top quality amateur cricket. The Club received several accolades for the quality of the ground and Mary Butler's magnificent tea.

On a similar note, on 11 August the Club provided facilities for Warwickshire girls U13s training squad and were impressed by the quality of the track provided by Jerry Ashley and Simon Hathaway - apparently, the best they had played on all season.

Judging by the increased number of dog owners and an exercise facility that seems to attract owners from far and wide to arrive by car as well as on foot, this is a problem that is fast getting to pandemic proportions! Strangely, this does not seem to happen when anyone is around to witness it and I doubt that the offenders are likely to read this rant.

HISTORY IN THE FIELDS!!

The history in the fields around us is really quite fascinating!

On our July Friendship Walk we were intrigued to walk past an Iron Age Hill Fort just to the west of Claverdon. We walked northwards, following the Monach'sWay, from The View (a café, just south of Wootton Wawen) along the canal until bridge 49 then turned eastwards on the footpath towards Kington Grange. As we walked towards Kington we passed on the left Barnmoor Wood Camp. The camp can clearly be seen as a wooded hill and dates from around 800BC to 500BC. It is fascinating to know that this part of Warwickshire was populated so long ago.



Barnmoor Wood Camp has a plateau area of about 3.5 acres which is surrounded by a bank of 11 feet and a ditch about 25 feet wide. Historic England believes that it is univallate which means it only had one ring of

defensive earthworks. Univallate forts are actually quite rare so this could be one of only about 150 in the country! Hillforts were an important part of the Iron Age British landscape. They had varying uses ranging from defensive areas where small communities could muster and



stand their ground when attacked by other local tribes, to communal gathering places or even strongholds of elites within the groups. Some may even have simply been enclosures for domesticated animals such as cows. The forts were used for about 150 to 200 years before being abandoned or rebuilt.

Having become more aware of small hill forts, Pete and I were walking close to Edgehill and found ourselves walking next to another Iron Age hill fort -Nadbury Camp at Arlescote. Closer to us, there is also a small hill fort at Oakley Wood and the more significant hill fort at Meon Hill.

On a lighter note, I sincerely hope that our editor's other half, being an esteemed archaeologist, has not found too many glaring errors and faults in this brief piece which has been written out of pure fascination! ["esteemed", I think not, his career was always in ruins! Ed.]

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ARDEN DIVISION COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

As I write this report there is coverage of the release of the UN Report on Climate Change detailing the progress, or not, that countries are making towards reducing greenhouse emissions. As UK is hosting COP26 in Glasgow this autumn I expect we shall see several climate change initiatives trickling down into Warwickshire over the coming months.

It was announced that the Women's Tour (a cycling event for professional women riders) will hold one of its legs in North Warwickshire. Cycling also features in Warwickshire's support for the Birmingham Commonwealth Games next summer. The road race is to be run over several circuits of a course that will start and finish at St. Nicholas Park in Warwick. The actual route is not confirmed yet, but spectators can stand by the side of road and watch the cyclist pass by on each circuit.

There is a regional ballot, before the main ballot opens in September, and anyone can create their ticket account and select tickets at: www.birmingham2022.com/tickets. The Games' organizers are also looking for an army of 13, 000 volunteers to join the Commonwealth Collective of essential volunteers. Smokers should be cautious when being offered cheap cigarettes, as rather than falling off the back of a lorry, they might have come instead from a sewer. Trading Standards Officers recently found a cache of illegal cigarettes in a sewer in Leamington.

Trading Standards are also warning people against using chain saw angle grinders. These machines have not passed safety checks and there have been a number of very serious injuries due to the chain flying off the disc and hitting the operator.

Warwickshire is supporting an initiative to help older drivers drive safely for as long as possible. The County has continued its partnership with IAM RoadSmart, the UK's largest independent road safety charity, to provide local residents with the opportunity to update their driving skills, increase confidence and safety by taking

part in a Mature Drivers Review Initiative. To book a free assessment, drivers, or people calling on their behalf, should call: 0300 303 1134 during office hours and quote reference: "WCC".

Improvements and updates have been made to an online resource for parents and carers in Warwickshire that provides information and support for children and young people with special educational needs and disability (SEND). This resource is called a SEND Local Offer and Warwickshire County Council has been working hard to improve its SEND Local Offer to ensure that families with SEND can find the information they need. The first phase of the discretionary community grants scheme has now closed and Arden Clerks and Chairs meeting will be determining the grants for Arden Division. A second phase will be opening shortly for decision sometime in October.

GREEN OUR WOLVERTON (GROW*) NEWS

Food for thought!

It's harvest season and this month's **GROW*** focus is on food. We all need to eat but how can we help save the planet while we do it?

Agriculture in the UK accounts for about 10% of emissions. The NFU has set a goal of reaching net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2040 but what can we, as consumers, do? Here are a few facts and suggestions.

AVOID WASTE: around 14% of food purchased in the UK is thrown away. The average household throws away £730 worth of food a year. This not only wastes the energy used in production but as food rots down it creates greenhouse gases including methane which is 25 times more potent than CO2. We need to avoid over buying and use left overs when possible. If you really have to throw food away, compost it!

BUY LOCAL and SEASONAL: this is the best way to minimise 'food miles' which produce

emissions as food is transported around the globe. However 'food miles' is not a straight forward issue; out of season some foods will be more energy efficient grown in a naturally sunny climate & transported than grown in a hothouse nearer home. Bananas come by boat so have much less carbon footprint than air freighted produce. Enjoying what's grown seasonally and locally can still give a varied diet for most of the year and avoid unnecessarily adding to climate change.

EAT WONKY!: misshapen fruit and vegetables can taste just as good, many supermarkets now sell them, don't let them go to waste, eat ugly!

EAT LESS MEAT and DAIRY: Red meat and dairy produce have the highest carbon footprint but cutting down does not mean you have to cut out completely. We live in a mixed farming area so many of us will want to support this. An Oxford University study suggested that if every family removed meat from one meal a week this would be equivalent to taking 16 million cars off the road or cutting the UK's carbon footprint by 50 million tonnes. Going vegetarian or vegan takes things much further but is not for everyone. Could your family cut out meat for one or more meals per week?

SUPPORT SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE: Food production globally is responsible for 60% of biodiversity loss with large areas of land including the rainforests being cleared for animal feed. When buying meat do you know where it has come from?

COOK & STORE EFFICIENTLY: Although cooking is usually less significant in energy consumption than production and transport we can still help by increasing our

efficiency. For example when cooking, where possible, combine dishes in the oven or one pan and don't pre-heat the oven for more than 5 minutes or leave it on for too long. Use a lid on pans to conserve heat. Don't overfill your fridge, but your freezer is more efficient full.

AVOID PLASTIC BOTTLES & EXCESS PACKAGING: Some foods need to be protected in packaging during transport and storage to avoid damage and waste but many do not. Where possible try and buy loose fruit and veg, perhaps take your own reusable bags (some supermarkets such as Sainsbury's sell these).

These may all seem small things in themselves but they are things we can all do and together this can make a difference!

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MANOR FARM WOLVERTON DIARY

More good news this month, as we cleared our statutory six-monthly TB test with all the herd testing clear. With the great amount of publicity of the case of the alpaca, Geronimo, the testing process has been a hot topic in the national press. We know from our experience that the test is only about 70% accurate, but DEFRA seem to have mudded the water by insisting that alpacas are injected with tuberculin about 30 days prior to the normal test, which is bound to raise questions about the accuracy of results. DEFRA seem to have backed themselves into a corner over this problem and can't seem to find a sensible solution. To my mind, if the animal was supposed to have TB five years ago, why hasn't it succumbed to the disease by now?

Once again, the cattle have caught up with the grass growth on their grazing fields, so we are supplementing their diet by feeding this new season's hay to keep them well and happy. They soon get bored and tend to eat their way into the hedge bottoms and uncover any weaknesses in the fences.

The cereal harvest is in full swing, with yields so far about average, which is not bad considering the mixture of growing conditions in the last year. There is a good yield of straw, which is the remains of the crop once the grain has been thrashed out by the combine harvester. This is very welcome as most reserves of straw were depleted by the late spring turnout of sheep and cattle across the country.

More news on the harvest next month as, having both winter and spring crops again this year, our harvest is spread over a long period.
