A brief statement from our Rector, the Rev. Richard Mutter

Dear friends,

I am writing to let you know that, following my recent period of enforced absence, I am returning to ministry within our five villages. Whilst I am looking forward to getting back to normal (whatever that might mean in these strange times), I am aware that a number of you will have some concerns over what has happened, and will have some questions. I know also that very many of you are feeling frustrated at the lack of information regarding what has been going on. I hope that this letter will go some way towards an explanation whilst recognising that there are some areas of people's private lives that should remain just that.

As most of you will be aware, Collette and I separated at Easter 2019. This was an extremely difficult time for both of us, and also for the children, especially given the public nature of our lives in the benefice. Our divorce was finalised later on that year, and arrangements were put in place for the children to spend their time with both their Mum and their Dad. I don't intend to say any more about the nature of our separation, nor about allegations that were made at that time except to remind you that they have now been thoroughly investigated.

Collette and I now have a good, sustainable relationship, and the children are happy with the new situation. We are all attempting to move on with our lives, and, as part of that, I am very much looking forward to returning to ministry within the Arden Valley. I am in conversation with the Churchwardens, Stig, Richard, and Joan about how and when that will be accomplished, but I hope that you will all be beginning to see a bit more of me in the future.

I can only apologise for the distress and disruption of the past two and a half years. It has not been an easy time for any of us, doubly so with the Covid-19 situation happening at the same time. I am extremely gratified by all of the work that has continued in the benefice during this time with continuing to provide worship and prayer for the benefice and for all of the innovation with regards to online services. I would ask that you hold Collette, the children, and me in your prayers and help us all to move towards the future and whatever it might hold. Yours in Christ and with much love, **Bichard**

A PERSONAL VIEW...

Emerging from lock down and, hopefully, the worst of the Covid-19 pandemic and acclimatising to new and changed lifestyles, means for many people that life feels ever more hectic, busy and stressful. Bishop Desmond Tutu, who prayed for an hour first thing every day, once said in an interview that when he was really busy, 'My goodness, I am so busy I must pray for twice as long'.

Such downtime for Mind, Body, and Spirit is essential to maintain a healthy balance in life. I have heard some say that finding time for God in a busy schedule also encourages God to find time for us. I am not so sure myself – such a transactional approach doesn't sit well with the concept of a loving God who just loves to be included and involved. However, a good relationship does mean that not only we can ask for help but also that we can be glad to receive it. Equally true of human relationships as with God.

However, in life there really are times when it is a case of summoning all hands to the pumps: the phone call that simply says, 'We need you. Come straight here. Explanations when you arrive.' It may be as simple as babysitting during an emergency, or a car breaking down, or comfort with the arrival of bad news. These are good times to have God with you too.

What does God really prefer? To be with us during morning prayers, or to be with us as we help a neighbour who has had a bad fall. The answer is, I suppose, that God enjoys both but is also clear about priorities too. Both times are important to a relationship, and both contribute to the strength of a relationship. It's not one or the other. God prefers both.



RECIPE – SPANISH ORANGE CHICKEN

Serves 4

Ingredients

6-8 chicken thighs

- 1tbsp olive oil
- 2 large onions diced
- 4 cloves garlic (roughly chopped)
- 7 fl oz sweet sherry
- 2 whole oranges
- 2 small bunches lemon thyme
- $3\frac{1}{2}$ oz large pitted green olives
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ oz butter

Method

- Heat oven to 200C
- Season chicken well.
- Heat oil in ovenproof casserole, fry chicken until golden on both sides. Set aside.
- In the same pan, fry onions for 5-10 minutes. Add garlic and fry for 2 minutes more.
- Turn heat down to medium, glaze pan with sherry and orange juice.
- Return chicken to pan skin side up.
- Add lemon thyme and cook in the oven for 25 minutes.
- Remove the skin, pith and pips of whole oranges and slice into 1 ¹/₂ inch thick rounds.
- After basting the chicken with its own pan juices, scatter the olives and orange slices and return to the oven for 20 minutes.
- Allow to rest for 10 minutes, stir in the butter and serve.

Keep orange slices on the top!

NORTON LINDSEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met on Tuesday, 12 October to hold its Ordinary monthly meeting.

Warwickshire County Council has put out their Highway Verge Management Policy for consultation. They recognised the biodiversity value of our roadside verges but road safety remains their primary objective. The County Council proposes that it will only enter into discussions about a change in the mowing regime subject to certain conditions which include the following speed limit must be 40mph or less, safety cannot be compromised or hinder the safe passage of highway users and consultation needs to be made with any affected properties within the vicinity of the verge.

It was agreed that Cllr Jon Stobart would be put forward as our representative on the Claverdon and District Nursing Fund and confirmed that Cllr Roger Mann is our representative on the Norton Lindsey Village Hall Committee.

We agreed that our Clerk, would in the first instance, apply to the Natwest bank for an online Community Account. If this turns out to be an inappropriate bank for the Parish Council, the Clerk will try other banks that have been put forward until hopefully we will find an online account that is free to use for the Parish Council.

Under the planning agenda item, it was agreed that the PC will take a 'neutral' stance on 3 Mill Close, application for an extension. However we raised objections to The Willows, Wolverton Road application for a garage and an extension to the house, principally due to the visual effects on the street scene and on the conservation area.

The street light outside the church is now working and Cllr Roger Mann kindly offered to 'mend' the Brittons Lane street sign which has been knocked over.

We discussed ideas about how we could celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee next year including the ideas given to us from residents. It was agreed that we would aim to cost each option and fill in the detail of where how when etc each option could be done. We will then consider the options together.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, 9 November 2021 at 7.45 pm in the Church Room. Full minutes of the October's meeting will be made available on our website at <u>https://nortonlindseypc.org/parish-</u>council-meetings/minutes-of-previous-meetings/ or from the Clerk.

We are also hoping to run a Christmas party for the children of the village on 11 December and a cheese and wine event in the New Year.



ARDEN DIVISION COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations will continue for the whole of next year across UK and around the world. Warwickshire has started a programme of celebration by planting the first tree in Warwickshire as part of the Queen's green Canopy (QGC) and everyone is encouraged to plant a tree



between October and March. The official celebrations run from June 2 to June 5 and beacons will be lighted on June 2. All Parishes in Arden Division have plans to celebrate the Jubilee in some way and more information will be coming out via the Parish Councils.



Warwickshire.

The High Sheriff of Warwickshire, Min Willoughby de Broke, recently completed a 200 miles cycle tour of Warwickshire to meet the people, organisations and small businesses that make Warwickshire the fine place it is to live, work and visit. She also raised £10,000 for the High Sheriff's Fund which provides small grants to community and voluntary organisations operating in

The County Highways team has confirmed that it will grit and salt all the usual roads across Warwickshire this winter. It is reassuring residents that, despite media claims to the contrary, the gritting fleet is unaffected by the ongoing shortage of Heavy Goods Vehicles Drivers and will operate as normal



over the winter months. To do this work the County has a fleet of 38 gritting vehicles running 29 routes with nine lorries in reserve.

Scams continue to blight out lives and there are too many to list. Some are short lived, but others keep appearing. Scams aren't just restricted to the Internet and many times cold 'phone calls are a front for a scam. Please be on your guard for anything that sounds too good to be true, or things like a notification for a parcel delivery you don't remember ordering. Arden Clerks and Chairs meeting was held at the beginning of October and progress on minor road schemes was reviewed. Road maintenance in Preston Bagot was highlighted as a problem. Funding for an extension to the 30mph speed limit along Wolverton Road, Wolverton Fields was approved as was a 20 mph speed limit through the centre of Ullenhall. Progress was reported on the design of new gateways and a speed bump on the western approach from Redditch in Ullenhall. County Highways have been asked to review flood risk in Back Lane, Henley in Arden. Claverdon Parish Council has authorised a payment of £500 to fund a design of a safer junction at the Green, Claverdon. The Environment Agency has been asked to assess the safety of the mill dam at Wotton Wawen.

Aden Clerks and Chairs also received briefings from the Rural Crime Team, Alcester North Police Unit and County Flood management.

GREEN OUR WOLVERTON (GROW*) NEWS

ROADSIDE VERGES - WOLVERTON BOTANICAL SURVEY 2021

Setting the scene: 700 species of wildflower grow on road verges in the UK, which is nearly 45% of our total flora. However, research shows that over the decades there has been a 20% drop in floral diversity due to poor verge management and nutrient pollution. With over 97% of meadows destroyed since the 1930s, road verges provide essential pollinator pathways and are a vital refuge for other wildlife. Roadside verges, whether on major or minor roads, can sustain an astonishing amount of wildlife: more pollinators are found on well-managed grass verges than in the neighbouring countryside. Today, most of the UK's grass road verges are either cut too frequently and at the wrong time or abandoned to scrub. The grass cuttings are left to lie rather than collected up, which creates a thick thatch and increases soil nutrient levels. This stimulates the growth of vigorous grasses and other nutrient-loving plants such as dock and bramble but inhibits the growth of most wildflower pollinator species which prefer much lower nutrient levels.



Survey results: From April to September this year, a series of botanical surveys were carried out on the three wide grass roadside verges on the Langley Road from Wolverton Crossroads to the parish boundary with Langley. Also included was the small grass verge leading up from the bench at the crossroads to the first gateway on the right. The total wildflower count over all verges, came to a modest 59 species and included: Agrimony, Birdsfoot Trefoil, Bluebell, Bristly Oxtongue, 4 different species of Buttercup, Cinquefoil, 3 different Cranesbills, Greater and Lesser Stitchwort, Hedge Woundwort, Knapweed, Red Clover, Teasel and White Bryony to name but a few. Our one and only county notable was a

beautiful Pyramidal orchid. The botanical records have been submitted to Warwickshire Biological Records Centre to be added to the county and national databases. Butterfly counts over the season were generally disappointing, with single figure numbers of Gatekeeper, Orange Tip, Meadow Brown, Ringlet, Large and Small White, Marbled White and Small Skipper recorded.

Verge cutting: Throughout the year, we have had ongoing communications with Warwickshire County Council asking them to review our local verge mowing schedule to fall in line with Plantlife's Roadside Verge Management guidelines. Many County Councils across the UK have now adopted these guidelines, recognising the financial and environmental benefits of the reduced mowing scheme recommended by Plantlife. In our case this was still not to be, and our grass verges were mowed at peak flowering time in May, despite the well-publicised 'No Mow May' initiative, and then again in July when the wildflowers had re-established; this too unfortunately coincided with the equally well-publicised citizen science 'Big Butterfly Count' project. This was very disappointing; however, this August WCC published a written commitment to aim for a net gain in habitat biodiversity across the county and will also be encouraging people to take part in 'No Mow May'. We look for to seeing this promise come to fruition next year and can only hope the condition of our grass verges will start to improve for our local roadside flora and fauna.

Verge litter: The amount of fast-food litter continues to add unnecessary hazards to our local wildlife on a seemingly daily basis. The GROW Litter pickers do a marvellous job trying to rid our village of debris caused by inconsiderate passers-by, but please do feel free to help us out if you happen to see some litter outside your property or when you're out for a walk on the footpaths or roads around the parish: recycle a used carrier bag, pick up the litter (particularly be on the lookout for small bits of plastic and other items which could be ingested when animals are feeding) and do your bit for the environment. If you come across any fly tipping, this can be reported online on the Stratford District Council website. Thank you!

MANOR FARM WOLVERTON DIARY

Normally in this diary I try to avoid having a good moan, but recently there seems to be a great deal of pressure to blame the beef and sheep producers for global warming. With the advent of COP26 and media overkill for anything "green", the criticism needs to be put into perspective. Various universities, and even the United Nations, have published reports proving that the wrong figures are being used about the effects of livestock emissions on global warming. They are now saying that methane only lasts about ten years and should not be classed with CO^2 (carbon dioxide) which lasts forever. In fact, two reports that I have seen say that both beef and sheep farming may contribute to global cooling.

There is also the policy to plant trees on productive farmland when, in the UK we are only 60% self-sufficient in feeding ourselves, compared with 86% not too many years ago. I have nothing against planting trees, as we have planted many on the farm and preserved a lot more, but they need to be planted in the right place.

Moan over, and back to farming at home.

The autumn planting here at Manor Farm is being completed today (15th October), with only a few field jobs left to do before winter. We have two fields which will remain fallow until spring, to be planted with linseed which produces that love bluish purple hue in summer.

The cattle are all back in the fields close to home and will soon be housed in the sheds with the silage clamp opened up for feeding. Unfortunately, after reporting last month on his good work over the summer, our pedigree bull became lame on one foot. The vet and the foot trimmer came to the same conclusion that he had broken a bone in his foot. As there was nothing practical that could be done to save him, he had to be euthanised. As he was only with us for five months and he had a good temperament, we are very sad to lose him, as normally we keep bulls for three years before selling them on. The financial loss, fortunately, will be covered by insurance.


