LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Around this time of year (mid-November as I write) the entire nation seems to start to think about Christmas. We have already seen the adverts on the TV, the Christmas menus in the pubs and restaurants, and I have no doubt that many of us have already started buying presents, cards, decorations and so on in preparation for the great day. This all actually fits in rather neatly with the idea that Advent (which begins this year on November 28th) is the season of preparation which precedes Christmas.

Hopefully, amongst all the bustle of shopping trips and cooking and wrapping we will be able to find some time to think about the true meaning of Christmas – the Nativity of Our Lord. Christmas has always had a feeling of newness and birth to me, although we know that Christ has been with us from the beginning, as John recounts in the marvellous prologue to his Gospel, there is always the sense of looking forwards to coming again, both in terms of the forthcoming Christmas feast, but also in His coming again in glory. In this sense Christmas is an invitation into a newer, deeper relationship with Christ, reborn every year as we celebrate together His birth in Jerusalem. This year perhaps, following all that has happened (and is still happening to some extent) with Covid-19, we are more in need of a new beginning than we ever have been, and to take time to stop and think about our faith and the part it plays in our lives.

As we all get ready for Christmas then, I invite you to find some time during the busyness to reflect on your relationship with God, to have a sort-of spiritual health check. The last 18 months have been particularly difficult for all of us, and it would be good to spend some time thinking about what we can do, as a Church, to put what is important to us at the centre of what we do and what we are. Personally I find myself reflecting on Paul's letter to the Colossians – "Set your mind on things that are above, not on things that are on the earth." (Col 3:2). Perhaps that ancient advice, written nearly two thousand years ago by one of the earliest followers of Christ, can have some relevance to our lives today...

However you go about preparing yourselves for Christmas, I do pray that you will have the opportunity to see families and friends during the season. I am looking forward to crisp, cold winter mornings and thoughts of sitting and reading (perhaps with a glass of wine) in the dark evenings. I wish you all the very best for Christmas (when it comes!).

RECIPE - POIRE BELLE HELENE

Serves 4

Ingredients

- 750 ml bottle of sparkling wine
- 200g caster sugar
- 5 cardamom pods crushed
- 4 pears not too ripe, peeled and left whole
- Vanilla ice-cream to serve

For the chocolate sauce,

- 4 tbs double cream
- 2 tbs golden syrup
- Knob of butter
- 150g plain chocolate, broken into small pieces



- You will need a pan where 4 pears will stand upright together.
- Put the wine and sugar into the pan and gently heat.
- Add cardamom and pears and some water if needed so the pears are just covered.
- Simmer until tender, about an hour.
- Cool then chill in fridge until required.
- For the sauce: heat the cream, golden syrup and butter, when melted pour over the chocolate, when melted whisk together.
- Put each pear into a serving bowl/dish, add the vanilla icecream and pour over the warm chocolate sauce.

NORTON LINDSEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met in the Church Room on Tuesday 9 November.

The Clerk reported that although hedges had been removed at Horsley House Farm despite planning conditions to the contrary, following a site visit and consultation with Warwickshire County Council, Warwick District Council (WDC) had decided the hedges had been of low quality and therefore there were insufficient grounds to take any remedial enforcement action.

The decision as to whether Warwick and Stratford upon Avon District Councils decide to merge will take place on 13 December. If the decision is a 'yes', then it will be referred to the Government for approval - a process which is likely to take a year or so.

There is progress on plans to erect pedestrian warning signs on the bend approaching the popular walking route from Snitterfield Lane to Blacon Farm - maps showing the required location of the signs have been forwarded to Warwickshire County Highways department.

Following representations to the Council, it was agreed to write to several householders in the village requesting that hedges needed to be cut back from overhanging the pavements to prevent the need to use the road carriageway.

There was discussion on the subject of the commemoration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Council is to decide the favoured options in priority order and then draw up more detailed plans and costings. Planning consent in the Conservation Area may be a factor to consider. It was also agreed to seek information from WDC on the policy and costs involved in holding a street party and Cllr. Brown would speak to other interested parties as to whether they would like to be involved in a joint event.

Cllr. Alan Rhead reported that Warwick and Stratford Councils had agreed a joint climate action emergency plan. As part of this plan, funds had been allocated to upgrade the heating in 3 council buildings to heat pumps, clean air monitors would be sited at schools where idling traffic was an issue, £18m had been allocated to sustainable council housing and consultations were

underway with building developers to ensure new housing standards were sustainable.

The new waste disposal contract, beginning in August 2022 had been won by Biffa and as part of this residents would keep grey bins (emptied every 3 weeks), green garden bins (emptied every two weeks) and be issued with a new bin for unsorted recycling waste (emptied every 2 weeks). This new bin would replace the current red boxes and hessian bags. There would also be a weekly collection of a waste food caddy bin. No decision had been made as to whether Warwick would join with Stratford in charging for garden waste bins, but there would be incentives to increase garden composting.

Plans for the new leisure centre in Kenilworth had been approved, closure dates for the existing facilities agreed and a building contract awarded.

Cllr. Rhead also reported that the revised grant for a building to house a village shop at the New Inn had been approved by WDC.

Cllr. Matecki reported that the review of 20 mph speed limits and onstreet/residents parking were ongoing, as was the review of outdoor centres following the closure of Marle Hall in North Wales.

The reduced opening hours of recycling centres resulting from Covid-19 were on-going, as was the appointment system, but it was now possible to do same day booking if space was still available. Cllr Matecki agreed that there is evidence of more fly tipping taking place. The fire and rescue service is looking for more on-call firemen.

It was agreed to site a Parish Christmas tree and lights at the same location as last year. Cllr. Brown offered to source a tree and progress.



PLANNING UPDATE

Norton Lindsey residents may be interested to know of two recent planning developments.

Behind Brick Kiln Close

Following Stratford upon Avon's planning department's rejection of the "Outline planning application for the development of 10 local needs dwellings" (Ref:19/01618/OUT) behind Brick Kiln Close, the applicant has lodged an appeal against the decision. If you wish to make comments, or modify/withdraw your previous representation, you can do so online at https://acp.planninginspectorate.gov.uk. The Planning Inspectorate Reference Number is APP/J3720/W/21/3282198. At the present time the Planning Inspectorate can only accept comments, modifications or withdrawals online. All representations must be received by 17 December 2021.

Breach Lane in Claverdon

Meanwhile the parallel application for affordable housing off Breach Lane in Claverdon was refused planning permission on the 29 October by Stratford District Council. Although there is no link between the two applications some of the reasons for this refusal may be of interest. ARDEN DIVISION COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

An example of how Warwickshire County Council (WCC) Green Shoots Fund can be useful in delivering projects is that Kineton Sports and Social Club (KSSC) received £ 8,995 funding to provide:

- Installation of one set of twinhead electric vehicle charging points, and
- Installation of low carbon airsource heat pumps.



A £1 million fund designed to harness the power of communities in tackling inequality and social exclusion has been launched. The WCC Social Impact Fund is seeking applications for grants. All applications received will be scored, with a positive weighting to those that benefit areas that have experienced higher Covid-19 rates, and areas of the county that experience multiple levels of deprivation.

For the build up to the Commonwealth Games, WCC museums are asking residents to tell them their **Commonwealth Stories** as part of a new exhibition. The personal connection to the Commonwealth might be through sport, work, holiday or family or friends. WCC has reacted to the government's National Bus Strategy by producing the county's **Bus Service Improvement Plan** (BSIP). The plan will support the council in its bid to central Government for a £150million share of the £3bn funding available to local authorities to help boost bus travel over a three-year period (2022-2025). The initial targets set in the Warwickshire BSIP focus on increasing passenger satisfaction, achieving passenger growth, improving bus punctuality and reducing bus journey times.

A consultation expected for December 2021 allowing local people to provide further comments on bus services to shape and finalise the Enhanced Partnership (EP) Plan and the first EP Schemes, which must be formally agreed with bus operators by 1 April 2022.

New look SEND Local Offer is a one stop shop for parents and carers and families of children with SEND up to the age of 25 to help them to access clear and accessible information on education, health and social care, training and employment, leisure and support in preparing for adulthood. It aims to provide information and support from early help through to more complex needs. The new and improved site -

https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/send has been co-produced with parents, carers and children whose experiences and opinions have helped shape the new look and feel to ensure that the site is easily accessible and has the right information and advice. Use a timer for your Christmas lights; avoid unnecessary plastic (choose those crackers carefully!); recycle your (non-metallic) Christmas wrapping, packaging and cards.

We are looking forward to the Carol Night at the pub on 16 December, all are welcome. The brass band is booked and we will be singing outside to reduce any Covid-19 risk.


The advent calendar silent auction is live and hopefully someone has 'won' the fantastic chocolate filled keepsake.

MANOR FARM WOLVERTON DIARY

After the last two very wet autumns, the weather has been much kinder to us this year. As we said last month, we have finally managed to plant all the remaining seed wheat and barley intended for planting in autumn 2019. We had the seed germination tested as we had stored it for two years and needed to know if it was still vigorous enough to be viable. Stored as it was in a cool, dry barn, the results were all between 98% and 99%, which is incredibly good for two year old seed. So, we were able to plant what we needed to return to some sort of normality in our cereal crop rotation. The newly planted fields have greened up well, proving that the germination tests were accurate.

The cattle are all inside the yards now and being fed on their winter diet of silage and rolled barley. We keep the calves well fed as this is the time they really start to grow, ready for them to be sold in February to other farmers. We keep their buildings well bedded down with straw, but they often prefer to be out in the open yards, especially on bright frosty mornings.
