RECIPE – OLIVE TREE LAMB AND APRICOT CASSEROLE

Serves 4

Ingredients

- 2lbs cubed boneless lamb
- 2tbs oil
- 2 medium onions finely chopped
- 1 medium onion studded with a dozen cloves
- 4oz dried soft apricots
- 2tbs plain flour
- Salt and pepper
- 1tbs ground cinnamon
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 clove garlic
- ³/₄ pint red wine
- ³/₄ pint stock
- 2tbs brown sugar
- 2tbs sultanas
- Toasted almonds to serve

Method

- Heat the oil in a heavy pan and brown the meat. Remove and set to one side.
- Brown the chopped onion in the same pan
- Add the garlic and then replace the lamb.
- Sprinkle on the flour and add the salt, pepper, cinnamon and bay leaves.
- Put the clove studded onion into the pan with the apricots and sultanas.
- Stir in the brown sugar, stock and wine and bring to a gentle simmer.
- Cover and cook at 150c/300f for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until the meat is tender.
- Remove clove studded onion, taste and correct seasoning and serve hot sprinkled with toasted almonds.



ARDEN DIVISION COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

At the time of writing most recent District Council ward data shows there were 24 cases of Covid-19 in Henley in Arden, 19 in Tanworth, 13 in Wootton and Snitterfield had 27. 77.9% of England's over 12 years had been vaccinated with at least one dose with Warwickshire - 83.5%, Stratford on Avon - 86.5% and Henley, Claverdon & Wootton Wawen area was 88.3%.

Warwickshire Fire & Rescue crews have been checking cars for residents in Bedworth, to ensure they're fully prepared for the colder months. I have asked the Fire and Rescue Service if they will extend this service to Arden Division.

Mentoring young adults over mental health is a concern as suicide amongst young males is the highest category in Warwickshire. WCC has appointed Coventry and Warwickshire Mind (CWM) to manage and deliver a new and innovative peer mentoring project. The year-long project, to support young adults aged 18-25 across the region with their mental health, is funded by Coventry and Warwickshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and launches on 6 December.

Counterfeit goods worth an estimated \pounds 100,000 and a value if genuine of more than $\pounds 1$ million were seized from traders operating on Furnace End market in the north of the County. If you are buying goods at car boot sales do take care as the goods might be counterfeit and unsafe.

The Warwickshire County Council Social Impact Fund (WSIF) is still accepting bids. Voluntary and community groups can submit their applications to a new £1million fund which has been launched to tackle inequality and exclusion. Telephone 01926 410410 for advice on bidding until 30 December.

It has taken a while but after much research, The New Inn has installed an air conditioning system made by Panasonic that not only covers the normal operations of heating and cooling the air but also includes a system to assist in reducing the flow of particles within its operating space *including viruses*.



MANOR FARM WOLVERTON DIARY

Although it is supposed to be a quiet period on the farm, we seem to be finding plenty of jobs to be done. First and foremost, the cattle need to be fed and bedded every day. They get three large sheargrabs of silage (about 2 tonnes) put into their feeders every morning, and, whilst most are standing around the feeders, we check the state of the bedding in the sheds. Sometimes they will require only one big round bale of straw, but at other times they may need up to four. Luckily most of the bedding down is done by our straw spreading machine, but two of the smaller pens need the big straw bales to be rolled out by hand. We are fortunate this year to have a plentiful supply of straw from our wheat and barley crops. This means we can bed the cattle down very generously, and they enjoy poking around the fresh straw to find some extra roughage.

Once the cattle are satisfied, we can decide on which of the many jobs waiting for us, maintenance of hedges, fences, and machinery. Hedges and fences are weather dependant, whilst we can retreat to the workshop on wet days, where we service what can be very complicated pieces of kit, saving a lot of money rather than paying very high labour costs to a dealer. On really cold, nasty days there is always the kitchen table where paperwork and finance matters need attention. Winter also usually throws up meetings and conferences, either in person or virtually, where new ideas and regulations are discussed with fellow farmers.

There are lots of other jobs to be do, hanging gates, tidying up fallen branches after the storms and replacing rotten gate posts, to name a few. We have to be jacks of all trades for this work and, hopefully, we are nearly masters of a few! There is always something to learn on the farm, however long we have been doing it.

We hope the New Year is happy and healthy for you all.




